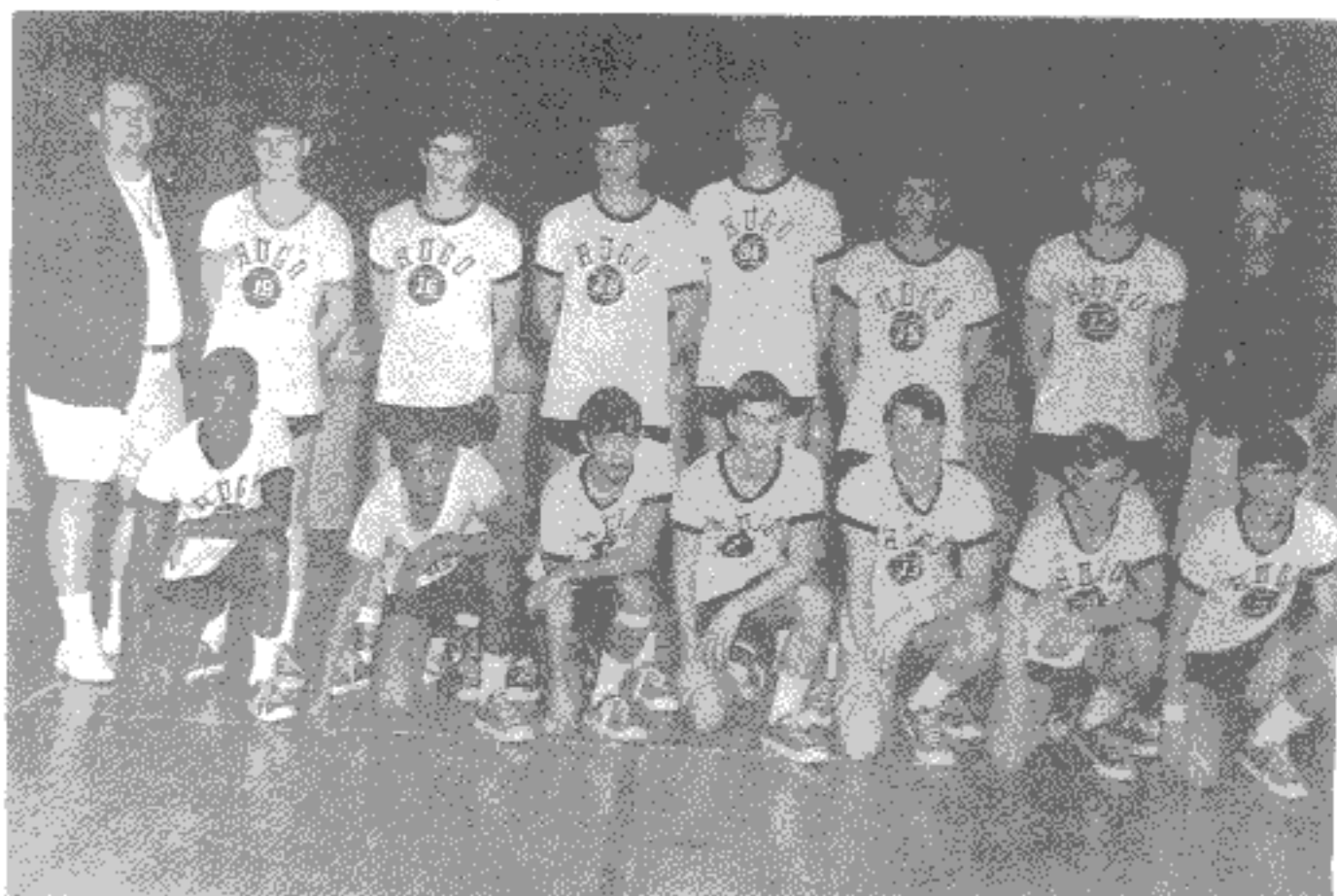

Is P.E. Needed ?

Physical fitness is a must in today's strenuous world. In order to do our best we must be active and alert physically as well as mentally. Schools, colleges, and universities throughout the United States are awakening and responding to the immense need for this course in their curriculums.

This marks the first year for physical education here in Hugo High School. Mrs. Alene Harris is instructor of Girls' Health and P. E. while Boys' Health and P. E. is taught by Mr. W. W. "Hoot" Gibson.

The objectives of this course are as follows:

1. Teach overall awareness of physical needs.
2. Provide opportunities for fulfilling these objectives
3. Teach leadership and the ability to give and follow instructions.
4. Improve social morals
5. Teach students of the vocational opportunities available in this field.
6. Teach good physical hygiene
7. Develop the attitude that a healthy body and a strong mind go hand in hand.
8. Overall personality development
9. Teach social adjustment
10. Develop self-discipline

This physical education program includes a wide variety of experiences and activities adapted to individual interests, such as camping and outing activities; dancing; gymnastics; stunts and tumbling; individual, dual, and team sports, and prescribed special exercises and activities.

The health program includes courses in personal self-development, mental health, physiology, kinesiology, public health, and first-aid and safety.

The enrollee's grade is based 50% upon P. E. and 50% upon health. In P. E. the participants are graded on attitude, participation, and improvement. Such things as written tests, pop quizzes, students report, and projects comprise the health portion.

Physical fitness tests will be given periodically to determine increased fitness, strength, cardiovascular efficiency, and co-ordination.

In addition to the regular classes individual students come for additional training from 3:30 to 5:00.

Extra activities that the classes plan to participate in are a half-time show during a future basketball game and a play night at which time they will perform.

Mr. Simon Parker, principal of HHS, had this to say about the physical fitness program; "Students vitally need physical exercise. This is why the President started the physical fitness program. Among other things this course helps build stamina, tones body, and builds resistance to colds."

Mr. Parker is also quite proud of the fact that HHS has been selected as one of the demonstrator schools in this field for southeastern Oklahoma.

It is indeed fortunate that IHHS offers a course that enables us first to become aware of our mental and physical capabilities and limitations and then to further develop and improve them.

RAYFORD CLARK WINS COVETED ALL-STATE FOOTBALL AWARD

Tailback Rayford Clark, who rushed more than two miles in three years and scored 49 career touchdowns, was named to All-State football teams.

Rayford scored 26 touchdowns and 162 points this season and rushed 1,763 yards. His record for three years are: 49 touchdowns, 310 points, and 3,515 yards.

He is the fifth Hugo all-stater in history and the first back ever chosen for the honor. He was also a strong contender for back-of-the-year honors.

Rayford will play in the annual North-South all-state game in Oklahoma City and will be eligible for the selection to the Bowl classic in Wichita Falls, Texas. Both games will be in August.
