Merj Moss scored for Antlers, but a penalty nullified the play. Then Hugo's Clifford Evan intercepted a pass to give the Buffs the ball and set up a TD.

Gerald Hutchings caught a 36 yard pass, and on the next play, Quarterback Greg Nash scored on an end run.

Hugo tried an onside kick and number 80, Louis Pearl, recovered for the Buffs. Nash scored again, but a penalty 21 yard pass and an off tackle play and the Buffs

were on the scoreboard again.

In the closing minutes of the first half, Antlers' John Walker intercepted a pass and Mardeth Farrel made a 45 yard run, but the Beareats could not score.

The score at the end of the half was Hugo 12, Antlers 0.

Nash scored again for Hugo on a 39 yard option play in the third quarter. The kick for the extra point was good.

Stanley Ketchum kicked a 22 yard field goal in the fourth quarter to give Hugo a 22-0 lead.
