The Hugo Science Club made a visit to the building site for the Hugo Dam and Reservoir. Mr. Frankey, one of the engineers, gave the club members a short tour and answered any questions.

The foundation for the dam must be smooth and solid. There are 90,000 yards of concrete in the structure. The surface concrete must be kept moist so that it won't dry out quicker than the concrete on the inside and cause cracking.

The structure has a storage capacity of 35,000 acres during flood pool and 13,500 acres during conservation pool.

The first date drawn was September 14 and those born on that date who are between the ages 19 and 26 will be first in line to be drafted in 1970. Men second in line for the draft will be those born April 24. The third date is December 30 then February 14 and October 18.

There will still be deferments and exemptions granted by local draft boards. These dates are effective for only one year and will be redrawn each year.

If any of you happen to have been born on February 26 or June 8 you don't have to worry for a year because those numbers are 365 and 366, "you lucky fellows."
