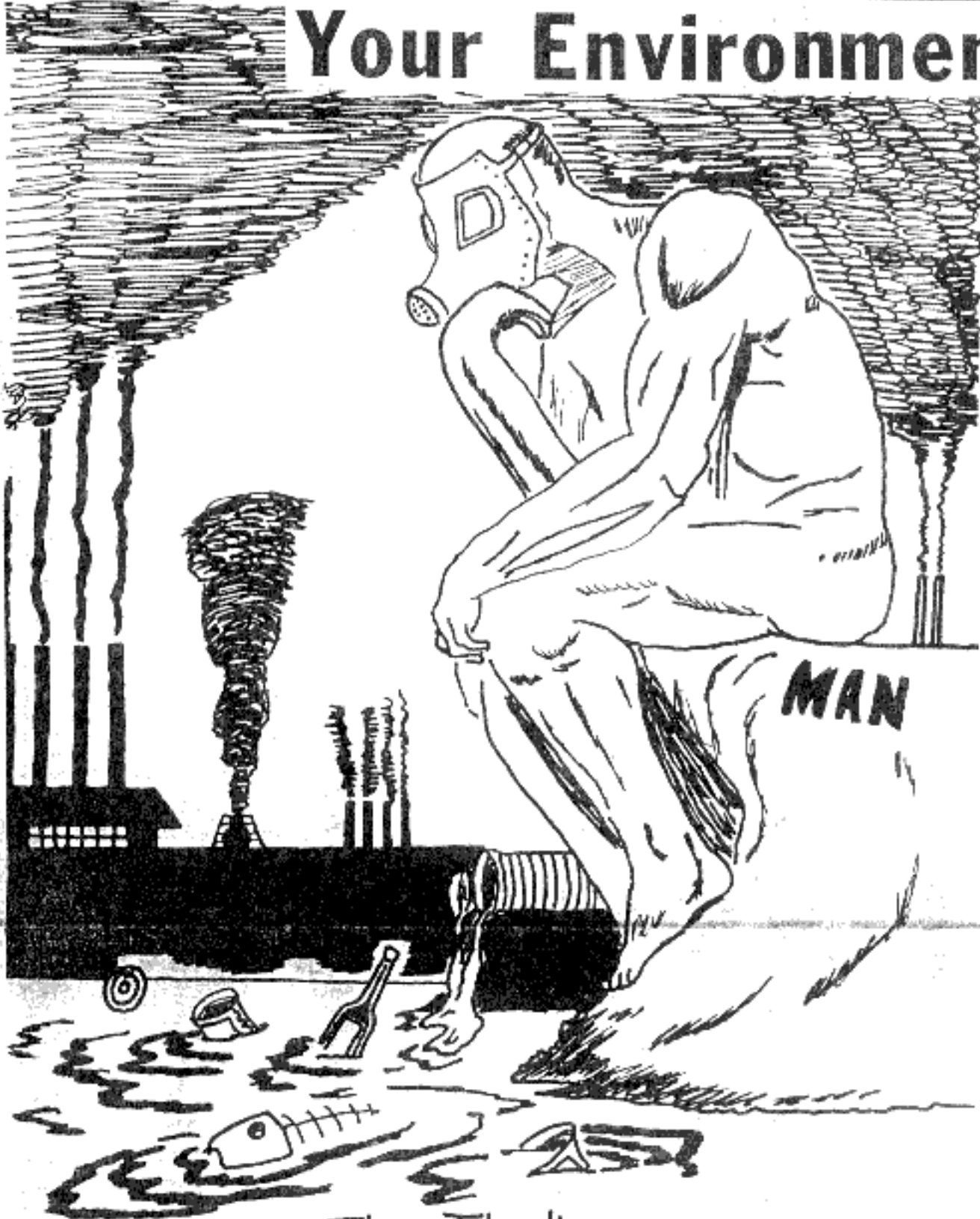


Your Environment Duty

Hugo Attends Track Meets

Saturday, March 14, the Little Dixie Relays were held at Idabel. It is the biggest meet in Southeastern Oklahoma.

The meet was the first of the season for most of the teams, including Hugo. Hugo made a fair showing, considering the weather conditions.

Alan Upchurch started the season off right by winning the broadjump with a leap of 20'11". Louis Pearl raced home with a second place finish with a time of 2:06.1. The 440 yard relay team composed of Upchurch, Wallace, Nash, and Harris finished 4th in 45.7.

The mile relay team of Larry Pearl, Jimmy Wallace, Greg Nash, and Louis Pearl finished fifth with a time of 3:43.1. Nash won fifth place

in the high hurdles in 16.3 and Wallace won fifth in the 220 with a 24.2 clocking.

On Saturday, March 21, Hugo was at Madill for the Wildest Relays. Even though it was cold and rainy, the boys made a real fine showing. They finished third in the meet with 23.5 points.

The 440 yard relay team won 3rd with a time of 46.7. The 880 yard relay team finished 2nd in 1:36.4. The spring medley foursome also won 2nd in 3:41.5. The mile relay won 3rd with a time of 3:50.1, and the 2 mile relay finished fourth in 9:14.3.

Greg Nash tied for 3rd in the high hurdles with a clocking of 16.2. As the season progresses and the weather gets better, so will our boys.

Students Hear Talk About Archeology

On Monday night, March 16, at 6:30 p.m. the first in a series of eight lectures was presented in the Hugo High School Science Room. The first lecture was on archeology. Mr. I. C. Gunning from Wilburton presented the speaker, Mr. Don Wycoff, state archeologist from Oklahoma University. Mr. Gunning is the executive secretary of the Eastern Oklahoma Chapter of Frontiers of Science Foundation.

Mr. Wycoff began with a lecture explaining archeology and concluded the program by showing slides of his work in Southeastern Oklahoma.

Archeology is not a course by itself. Archeology is a part of anthropology. An archeologist studies prehistoric man and his material culture. In his work the archeologist

has two main problems: Trying to learn when people were in an area and trying to learn what these people were doing and how they were doing it.

Research that is now being done in California may prove that the Indian was here one hundred thousands years ago.

The first research that was done in Southeast Oklahoma was done in Choctaw County. Most research takes place at building sites for dams.

The important findings are projectile points, pottery, burials, rituals, houses, and middens (trash dumps). During a certain period of time the artifacts of a particular culture had a certain style. If the archeologist can't date the artifacts by radio carbon dating, he uses comparison dating. In the latter method he

looks at the style of the artifacts and compares them with others that are dated.

Archeology is very beneficial to man. Through archeology man learns much about the people who lived before him.

The purpose of these lectures is to acquaint students with the sciences that they don't come in contact with in high school. The next lecture will be on biochemistry.

Don Comfort Gives Program In Assembly

On March 31, Mr. Don Comfort presented an assembly program to the student body. He is a very talented accordion player.

Mr. Comfort started to study the accordion at the age of eight, and majored in music in high school. He earned an Associate of Arts degree in

music, and made further studies in music composition and orchestration at the University of Redlands in California. Much of his serious training and study of the classes was with Anthony Galka-Rini, world famous concert accordion artist.

Mr. Comfort has done

television work and has appeared coast-to-coast over the National Broadcasting Company on several occasions. He plays for National School Assemblies of North Hollywood, California and Southern School Assemblies of Austin, Texas and has given his accordion program to more

than twelve million students and faculties in most of the United States and two provinces of Canada.

He featured two very special electric accordions. The first was a stereo amplified instrument containing four internally mounted microphones. The other was

an all solid state fully electronic Sonorana accordion which sounds like a fine organ.

Mr. Comfort is a member of the International Platform Association, and brings to his audiences a well rounded program ranging from classical to the very latest in popular music.
