The invitation was extended Monday and the team accepted immediately.

The Meet of Champions matches the winners of each event in the state meet in all four classes — 1-A, 2-A, 3-A and 4-A — plus the next two best times.

Leon Davis was clocked in 50.9, Harris in 49.0 flat, Wallace in 50.4 and Pearl in 50.5 when they reeled off their 3:20.8 in the state meet. They finished second to Wewoka which ran a 3:20.7.
