Choctaw Language Rules

Rule 1

The basic vowels are usually written with the letters a, i, and o.

a sounds like

1. a in the word water, or

2. a in the word sofa

i sounds like

1. i in the word pit, or

2. i in the word machine (e sound)

o has a very unique sound. There is not an English word which equates this unique sound. You will learn this sound by listening to and repeating the examples given. Click on the words to the left to hear the pronunciation.

Genealogy Do-Over

I started researching my family about 10 years ago. While I had a desktop computer at home, I didn't have the Internet. I went to the local library and did a little research on their computer on "how" to research. I learned their was such a thing as a genealogy database program and knew being computer oriented that was the way for me.

I ordered Family Tree Maker and waited very impatiently for it to arrive. In the meantime, I was spending a small fortune printing everything I could get my hands on to take home and enter into my new database.

You might say, what's wrong with that? Oh, if only I knew then what I know now. I did so many things wrong. Some I knew as I was doing at the time and thought I'd fix it later and some I didn't know any better.

For instance, I had very clearly read all about the importance of citing sources. While I did write on the back of many of the documents I printed where I got it, I wasn't consistent with transferring those citations into my database. It wasn't a problem, I knew where I got it and I wasn't sharing my information with anyone else anyway. My database grew.

Then I got the Internet at home and boy was my world opened up. I was able to upload a tree to Ancestry and next thing I knew I was finding all kinds of information from other people I didn't have. I was adding other people's unsourced information into my tree left and right. I'm sure you can guess my next mistake. I merged someone else's tree with mine. My database quadrupled. Now in my defense, I was only trying to merge a section of their tree into mine and accidently merged the whole thing. That being said, I would NEVER merge someone else's tree into mine today. That tree merge has been the bane of my existence for almost a decade. Couple that with the fact that their tree wasn't sourced either and man, what a headache! Now my database was extremely large and I was having a hard time differentiating between their information and my own. Hardly anything was sourced, mine or theirs, because I had yet to go back and source my information like I told myself I would.

Then I joined my local Genealogy Society. There was so little information from my county available that documenting information from my county was my priority. I could link most of the information to my

database even thought the people were not related to me, so I thought one database is better than a bunch of different ones. I still wasn't citing sources like I should have been...if at all.

Skip ahead 10 years. I now have a database with well over 45,000 people. Over half of this is from the merged tree. Little to no source information. And no, I don't remember where I got anything! I was so sure I would remember.

People come to me to help them with their research and all I can think about is how embarrassing it is that my personal work is a perfect example of everything NOT to do.

About a year ago, I took all of my online trees off the Internet. I didn't want to spread misinformation around and I couldn't be sure that I wasn't.

The plan was to basically start over. I got a new genealogy database program that had a feature that helped with creating source citations correctly (Legacy Family Tree Software) which was going to be my main focus.

Well. That didn't happen. What a daunting task. How extremely boring and so NOT fun. Just the thought of the reality of what I was undertaking stopped me in my tracks. So, my work has sat there untouched for almost a year. I refused to research and add to the mess and yet I am dragging my feet about cleaning up my mess.

WELL NO MORE PROCRASTINATING! NO MORE EXCUSES!

Born in Brenham, Tex., Mrs. Frederick first came to Oklahoma in 1911 with her husband, the late Oscar Frederick. Her education included attendance at Paris Junior College, Paris, Tex., and other college work was done at Brenham, Denton, the University of Texas and Texas Christian University and Southeastern State College, Durant. Mrs. Frederick has taught mathematics and history in both the elementary and high school grades in Ft. Towson.

Two years ago she was named Choctaw county's teacher of the year and was honored as such at the Okalhoma State Fair in Oklahoma City.

Babcocks Look Back: 64 Years Together

Arnold Edward Babcock says looking back on life brings one big event to mind: His marriage to Katic.

But, he says, it took three long years to get it done.

Arnold said the first time he asked Katie's father for her hand in marriage he pulled out a shotgun.

The second time he pulled out a shotgun.

For three years this went on, they both smiled.

Then one day, three years after that first encounter, Katic's father went to town and the couple cloped.

Circus - Fulton Family

The Fulton Family is SPECIAL with capital letters. I've known of them for a long time, but I've only got to know them recently. I knew they were on circus, not that they all were on circus. I met Michael Fulton on volunteer projects, and asked if I could write about his family. So, here we are. The Jack and Barbara Fulton family is based in Hugo, OK. They had 5 children, 4 sons, Jack, Michael, Dana & Randy, and 1 daughter, Lisa. Jack and Barbara raised their family on circus. The Fulton family history has not always been circus. They have always been Choctaw.



Their grandfather, Jeff Fulton, was a US Marshall in the early 1900's. Jeff is pictured in a mural in the Choctaw

Nation Museum. Complete Records of Choctaws at that time have gone missing. We must rely on memories and stories as Native Americans done for centuries.

Their father, Jack Lloyd Fulton, was growing up at Goodland Academy, near Hugo, OK (Circus City). There must have been circus/saw dust in the air causing Jack to run away and join a circus. He hopped a ride

on a freight train to Kansas where he joined Kelly Miller. Jack was a natural with animals. He worked with mostly horses and elephants. The animals each had special transportation needs. Since a circus moves to a new location every day this is essential for circus operation. Jack became Transportation Superintendent. He was responsible for the operation and maintenance of all, 35-50, trucks to move the circus.

Their Mother, Barbara
June Freydenall, joined
Kelly Miller when she
was 18 years old. Barbara's introduction to circus was not as exciting as
Jack's. She was a niece of
DR and Isla Miller, Owners of Kelly Miller Circus;





circus/sawdust was in her blood. Barbara started as a showgirl. She learned her talents were better suited to cooking, costume designing and elephant blanket making. These jobs are not glamorous but the results, costumes & blankets, are glamorous. She would cook for more than 100 people or more, all working on circus. Costumes usually

had thousands of sequins, all sewn on

by hand. The elephant blankets were very large. They would probably cover a pickup truck.

Jack and Barbara both worked in the background of circus operations. They met and married.

Their family had the benefit of an extended family, all on circus. Everyone helps each other, like a neighborhood. Unlike a neighborhood they move their home to a new location every day for about 220 days each year. Growing up on circus the children learned all aspects of circus business.

The boys like their dad, have a talent for working with animals. Lisa like her mom has a talent for costume and show design. Since retiring from circus Jack, Mike and Dana have been called upon for special animal needs: Providing an elephant for a promotional event; Transporting a tiger to a zoo; Tracking an animal that gets loose, elephants, tigers, etc.; and filling in when and where needed during circus season. The Fulton family did not get star billing, but as D. R. Miller said "The show would not go on without the Fultons."



Fuller Family

I've been researching the FULLER fam-

ily tree for my husband

I'm researching my husband's father's side of the family and am having problems doing so because of the conflicting (or missing) info out there. Any help would be appreciated. The following information is all I know starting with my father-in-law:

1) Carl W FULLER

b 1921 in Ashdown, Red River, AR d 1959 in Germany

m Loretta E Hoffman - date and place unknown

2) father: John A FULLER b. Arkansas

date /place of death unknown.
3) mother: Myrtle CLARDY - date/ place of birth unkn.

date/place of marriage unknown (AR, OK, GA?)

Carl W. FULLER died unexpectedly at the age of 37. The family always traveled with him so they never had the opportunity to get to know their grandparents, or their grandmother's maiden name.

The discrepancy in the spelling of Myrtle's last name comes from my father-in-law's military papers where he spells it "CLARITY". However, I believe it is CLARDY.

My husband and his siblings tell me their parents both told them both of their paternal grandparents come from a Native American [Cherokee or Choctaw?] bloodline. The only information I can find to prove this is on my father-in-law's military papers / personal history where he indicates he is "native" as opposed to "white",

but then, later orders, etc. indicate he is "white". I belive this was an oversight of the person who filled out the later documents. Further, I'm not sure if John and Myrtle were married in Ok, AR, or TX, or OK because I cannot find a marriage license. My husband and siblings all tell me their parents told them there is Cherokee blood from both sides of their paternal grandparents; that their grandfather met Myrtle on an Indian reservation in Oklahoma and took her to Arkansas, then later moved to Texas. Any help you can give me on this research would be greatly appreciated.
